About Treloar's

Treloar's is a charity which runs one of the UK's largest specialist education centres for young disabled people to live and learn. Through our school and college, we offer students the opportunity to fully take part in life and achieve their aspirations.

We support around 170 children and young people, aged 4 to 25 years, who come from across the country. All of our students are physically disabled, many with complex clinical needs and a sensory impairment. Our highly specialist staff deliver outstanding education, therapy and care for our students. But we need your support to do so much more.

It is essential that we raise £2 million every year, in addition to the funding we receive from Local Authorities. We must also develop our expert services to support students and disabled people more widely.

Your donations help us keep pace with the increasingly complex medical and care needs of our students and provides them with access to specialist staff, accommodation and equipment to unlock their potential and enable them to live a fulfilling life.

Student achievements

Outcomes for School (2024)

- Of the nine school leavers in July 2024, 100% moved on from Treloar School to Treloar College
- The significant majority of school students met or exceeded their expected progress in their Individual Education Plan Skills domains
- Achievement of student targets against their Education and Healthcare Plan (EHCP) outcomes was very positive at 87%
- Achievement of academic targets was high – 93% English, 94% maths, 98% Personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE)





Outcomes for College (2024)

- At their 9 month follow up 87% of our July 2023 leavers had achieved their aim of placement (intended destinations on leaving Treloar's in terms of education, employment and living) or achieved an appropriate alternative
- The significant majority of college students met or exceeded their expected progress in their Individual Education Plan Skills domains
- Achievement of student targets against their EHCP outcomes was positive at 89%

Employment

Just one of the 2023 alumni has managed to secure voluntary employment; two are self-employed and two are engaged in on-the-job training schemes. As in past years our overall number of former students in employment continues to remain low.





Amirah's experience of being at Treloar's:

"When I first started at Treloar's, I was extremely nervous and anxious as I've never been away from home before.

As time went on, I became very happy here. Before I started, I was very low on confidence, I had no friends at all in my previous school but as soon as I came to Treloar's I felt like I fit in. I feel like my confidence and independence has increased a significant amount and I have a lot more friends here.

I used to be very scared to ask for help or to ask for anything I need. At Treloar's the staff always encourage me to ask them to help no matter what it is because that's what they're there for. Every student here has similar disabilities as me, so I don't have to be embarrassed or ashamed of my disability. I'm a residential student, I stay Sunday evening to Friday afternoon. At the moment I'm doing BTEC in work skills and employability which gets graded at the end of the year. I also do maths and English which is not so fun but at the end of the day it's important.

Every Thursday I have hydrotherapy, this helps my muscles relax. I have physio every Monday where I use my walker, the Innowalk standing machine, or I have stretches (not all on the same day of course). I use the Motomed and my Lecky standing frame in class and on the house, this is very good exercise for me. I also have speech and language therapy, where I practice my breathing skills and speaking louder in busy environments."

We are so lucky to have been supported by the wonderful Friends of Treloar's who fundraise throughout the year, with many events including the well-established annual Treloar's Plant Sale.

The annual visit is an opportunity for us to demonstrate to these generous organisations the difference they are making to our students.


inclusion and working alongside our student-led accessibility project, Let Me In, to increase awareness of inclusive employment practices.

Helping our students to thrive



Thanks to the generosity of our supporter community, students will be introduced to new worlds though our interactive and immersive learning centre and explore the real world, experiencing higher education and meaningful employment opportunities thanks to a state-of-the-art electric bus. Participating fully in learning through better access to communication is made possible by assistive technology, and thanks to our hoist replacement programme, students move about their classrooms and bedrooms with ease – all generously funded by our supporter community.

Unlocking the power of Assistive Technology

Before arriving at Treloar's, many of our students are often denied access to educational opportunities due to their complex physical disabilities. Charitable donations help us to provide immediate and sustainable solutions that give our students access to technology which breaks down barriers to education.

Thanks to the incredible technology and our in-house Assistive Technology department students can unlock greater communication capabilities and independence through the use of adaptations and technology.

"Technology really helps me in my daily life and in college, I have an adapted touch pad which helps get around the computer, otherwise I wouldn't be able to do any work. The computers in college can be adapted to anyone's needs, for example, adapted keyboards with easy access for students with additional needs."

Dignity and Inclusion

During the last three years, we have taken on the epic challenge of replacing and refurbishing the 151 Maxi Sky 600 hoists throughout our campus. These hoists are crucial for safely moving students within classrooms, learning areas, and residential houses. They also help our brilliant staff team to reduce potential injury from lifting. Thanks to charitable donations we have been able to replace and refurbish 40 of these hoists this year, promoting greater independence and comfort for students. Above all, hoists protect the dignity of our students, enabling them to transfer swiftly and safely.

"The increasingly complex needs of our students mean hoists are an absolute necessity for safely manoeuvring our students within their classrooms and learning areas and in the residential houses. Having hoists available in each room plays a huge role in unlocking the potential in our students and enabling them a greater level of independence, choice and comfort." Students take the lead in improving our spaces

Our community of supporters has enabled us to realise our dream of updating and relocating the existing Learning Resource Centre Library and Technology Hub at Treloar's to a more accessible central location for both School and College students. The whole space was co-produced with our students who provided feedback during the design process.

The new Bradbury Learning Centre is designed for students with complex needs, enhancing literacy, numeracy and life skills, through modern technology and interactive experiences. The space includes state-of-the-art gaming workstations, interactive sand play for our younger students, greenscreen technology supporting our students to create their own content and the student's favourite area; a fully immersive and interactive room which allows students to interact with preprogrammed scenarios projected into the room.

Books are such a big part of our student's lives – stories give them the opportunity to disappear into another world, forget their worries and learn about different people, places and culture. Alongside the high-tech immersive experiences, we have upgraded the library too. It is now a tranquil, safe space where our students can lose themselves in a story.

Most importantly of all, the new Bradbury Learning Centre, is providing a lot of fun and happiness – the sounds of giggling and laughter (from students and staff!) always accompany a session in the Centre.

"I enjoy the variety of activities on offer in the Bradbury Learning Centre, but my favourite thing is the immersive learning room. I like it because it has something for everyone, it's a good way to learn and it is fun. The opportunities for teamwork, hand skills, coordination and reading help me learn and it's easier to learn about something when you can experience it. The Bradbury Learning Centre makes me feel relaxed, happy, calm and like I want to have fun!"

All aboard

Over the years, we have seen the complexity of our student's needs increase and today all of our students are reliant on wheelchairs. This makes our fleet of specialist vehicles a lifeline for our students. Specially adapted transport enables class trips, access to work experience opportunities, attendance at sporting and social events, independence skills practice with our community partners and travel to HSDC Alton College for further education.

"Being in a mainstream environment has developed my independence tremendously, I have become more confident, and I've found my voice." Logan, Treloar's and HSDC Alton Our fleet of vehicles was undertaking 3,500 journeys a year, but this was still short of the demand for trips so we would often have to decline trips or hire in additional transport. One of our fabulous supporters heard about our problem and generously suggested a matched fundraising campaign whereby their Foundation would match every gift pound for pound. This galvanised our community of supporters and thanks to their donations we were able to look forward to the delivery of the new bus later in the year.



Delali's story

"Hi my name is Delali and I will be telling you about my experience at Treloar's.

It is a lovely place to be and there is a lovely community. At first, I was a little nervous and shy but slowly I opened up. My favourite place on campus is the house and the enterprise class (Art). I also get to be more independent, and I get to make choices for myself. Being at Treloar's has made me think about the career I would like to get into. I would like to get into music journalism, in the future.



The weekly transition sessions help to find out how other students live independently and what they do for leisure."

Hope's story

"I started Treloar's in March of 2023 at the age of 17 years old.

When I started Treloar's I was excited to be around people with the same disabilities as me, on that first day I arrived I stayed in a residential house called Wessex House and I was a little bit nervous because I have never lived away from home by myself before, but I knew that I had very experienced staff around to help me if I got scared.

I found living away from home challenging. I overcame this by keeping myself busy, by meeting new people and socializing with them. I enjoy being more independent and trying new things I have not tried before. The clubs that are available are art club, boccia, nail art club, wheelchair dancing and so much more. On the weekends, if you are staying, there are trips you can go on with your peers and staff.

The benefits of staying in a residential house are that you can be more

independent, and the staff are around there to help if you need it. From when I left my mainstream school, I was slowly losing my independence, but ever since I have come to Treloar's the staff are around and they don't pressure you, so if you can't do a task, they can support you."

Freddie's story

Freddie was just four months old when his parents Chris and Sophie, started to notice that he wasn't moving his legs as much as other babies, and went to their GP.

At 6 months old, he was diagnosed with Spinal Muscular Atrophy type 1, and they were told he might not make his second birthday.

Reeling from the news, they went home and resolved to be strong and get on with life, to make sure they would enjoy every minute with Freddie and give him the best possible life.

Freddie is now 7 years old and attends
Treloar Primary School. When he first
arrived, he was using head movements
to indicate 'Yes' or 'No'. At Treloar's
specialist staff have supported him to
use a communication device to help him
have a voice and make a sound. Sophie
says "it's life changing for him, he has
a voice now."

Chris says "coming down in the morning and hearing 'Good morning Mummy, Good morning Daddy', is amazing because we never heard it before, it's just the best thing, for Freddie it's amazing."

Treloar's specialist staff worked closely with the family to get to know Freddie's clinical needs and for him to build up trust in the team around him. The staff have a great relationship with him and he's very affectionate. At Treloar's care and therapy are integrated into day-to-day activities within the curriculum.

Having the opportunity to learn to drive his power chair has been great for giving him the independence to explore and to participate.

Chris says "If Freddie hadn't come to Treloar's I genuinely don't think he would have been in school, I don't think he would have achieved half as much."

Sophie says "Having the support that Treloar's offer in terms of respiratory physios and the nurses, he has physio technicians with him 24/7, it's such a safety net for us knowing that in any situation there's someone there on call who can be with him within seconds."

"His journey has been amazing, inspirational, he's grown in confidence, his ability to participate in a classroom environment, his complex health condition has greatly improved since he started here." Yvette Walker - Specialist Staff Nurse

Financial summary

In 2023/24 Treloar's showed a net deficit of £232k (2023: £1.41m), before actuarial gains of £88k, (2023: £272k) on a turnover of £30.6m (2023: £27.7m).

Strong staff recruitment enabled a growth in student numbers in the first half of the year (up 3 to 169) which combined with a small price rise and a growth in complexity helped increase income by 10.0% to £30.5m (2023: £27.7m).

Donations and legacies increased by 26.6% to £1.57m (2023: £1.24m), reflecting the success of the major campaigns during the year. Event income continued to grow reflecting the success of our key events, to £280k (2023: £202k) helping other fundraising activities increase to £489k (2023: £398k). Overall fundraising raised £2.1m, surpassing its £2.0m target.

Although income was up significantly, this was offset by inflationary pressures, a fuller staffing compliment and unexpected maintenance costs on fire precautions pushed expenditure up by almost as much to £31.4m (2023: £28.5m).

The 2024 gain on investments of £491k compared favourably to a £533k loss in 2023. Further actuarial gains on the Defined Benefit Pension Scheme of £88k (2023: £272k) also helped to reduce the negative net movement on the charity's funds by £114k (2023: £1.14m).

Balance sheet and cash flow highlights include an increase in tangible fixed assets as the Trust continued its investment in the school and college campus including completing the pool refurbishment, developing the new Bradbury Learning Centre, raising funds for a new electric bus, as well as continued health and safety improvements. Much of this investment was supported by investments and

accordingly these have reduced by £1.4m to £8.53m and general reserves have reduced to £2.44m (£4.00m). Net assets at the year end were £29.1m (2023: £29.3m).

General reserves are deemed to be those that are readily realisable less funds whose use is restricted or designated for a particular purpose. Thus, the calculation of general reserves excludes property and other fixed assets that continue to be used in the day to day operation of Treloar's and in particular the buildings used by the school and college.

The Designated Fund primarily represents the net book value of tangible fixed assets, which have been purchased with unrestricted funds. This reserve is locked into the value of the estate and can be released only if all or part of the estate is sold. The value of the fund rose during the year to £20.5m (2023: £19.7m) because of new building works. Restricted funds of £10.0m (2023: £9.84m) represent monies received for a restricted purpose with the vast majority of these funds linked to specific building appeals of £8.83m (2023: £9.21m). Endowed funds of £1.62m (2023: £1.55m) are made up of the Rossington Fund £942k (2023: £878k) and Billesden Fund £676k (2023: £676k) and are applied to help students access education and to help monitor and support alumni progress respectively.

The historic Defined Benefit Pension scheme fund deficit relates to the excess of liabilities over assets in the defined benefit scheme. In 2023/24 the value of assets increased by £657k to £21.8m and this was partly offset by the total of

future obligations increasing by £227k to £27.2m. Overall, the net deficit reduced to £5.41m (2023: £5.84m).

The Trustees regularly review the value of the reserves required to be held in investments, cash and cash equivalents not restricted to or designated for any particular purpose. Ideally the Trustees believe that a general reserve of 3 months expenditure is needed to provide adequate working capital, to create a buffer in case of a sudden reduction in student numbers and to allow for fluctuations in investment returns. At 31 August 2024, the General Reserve was £2.44m (2023: £4.00m). This figure is lower than the reserve level targeted by Trustees even when long term finance is factored in. However, the Trustees consider this level of general reserves to be adequate at this time.
