NHS facing 'super flu' surge

The NHS is facing a "worst case scenario" for December due to a surge in flu cases, with an average of 2,660 patients per day in hospital beds with flu. This is the highest ever for this time of year.

 To protect others and prevent hospital admissions, we ask you keep your young person at home if they have a cough or cold.

The children's flu vaccine is offered on the NHS every year in autumn or early winter.

- We urge you to review your young person's immunisation records. Please seek advice from your GP if unsure.
- We need to keep accurate records of student and staff vaccination records so please contact Health Centre Admin team to update them. This helps us risk assess in the event of an outbreak.

Balloon gastrostomies

Our clinical assistant checks and replaces the water in student gastrostomy balloons each week. This helps reduce the risk of displacement, which can cause local trauma and interrupt routine medicines and feed.

 If your young person is not registered with our contracted medical practice, Farnham Dene, please send in a sufficient stock of 'water for injections'.

During autumn Physical Well-being sessions, school students were actively engaged in refining both gross and fine motor skills through purposeful, student-led exploration. Using familiar PE and sports equipment in innovative ways, they demonstrated adaptability, problem-solving and creative thinking. For instance, repurposing table cricket ramps to launch larger balls at skeleton skittles or aiming through pumpkin polybat targets encouraged students to experiment with force, coordination and precision.

More importantly, students modified activities to suit their individual needs, tailoring their experiences to achieve personal goals as well as boosting their self-esteem and confidence. It is clear that when learning is both inclusive and imaginative, the outcomes go far beyond the activity.

demonstrated initiative and

This idea was not only embraced
but transformed into a rich learning
opportunity, where students took
ownership of the planning process,
developing skills in collaboration,

thinking.

Students thoughtfully selected the activities they wished to include, resulting in a dynamic event featuring a lively disco with musical statues, imaginative costume design, a sensory exploration area, interactive games and a pumpkin decorating contest. Each element reflected student interests and choices and the event was a testament to the power of student voice in fostering engagement, responsibility and community.

Celebrating National Occupational Therapy Week

At the start of November, Treloar's Occupational Therapy Team shared with us student stories that showcased the life-changing impact of ocupational therapy across the school and college.

Malita's story

Thanks to the support of our Occupational Therapy Team, school student Malita has been able to explore alternative ways to gain independent mobility. Through regular on-site driving sessions using the Ability Drive system, the OT Team has helped Malita demonstrate skills in driving a SMART Platform using her eyes. This adaptive technology has unlocked her potential to independently control a powered wheelchair.

Zara's story

At the beginning of this year, school student Zara met with our OT Team to talk about her hand skills and identify what goals and targets she wanted to work on. Zara expressed she wanted to make her own prom dress and to be able to use a sewing machine. As a result, the team sourced a switch-operated sewing machine for Zara who made a beautiful black dress in time for her prom in July.

What occupational therapy means to our students (in their own words):

"OT have been really helpful. I have been able to get different foot rests on my shower chair so they are more comfortable for me. I have been working with Lou on my community skills so I can go out on my own safely in the local town. I have been on some community skill sessions with my friend Thomas. We have been to Alton Town Centre and we have been on a train to Aldershot. With Lou's assistance I phoned up (National Rail Enquiries) about train assistance for wheelchair users."

"Our OT group on Thursday is amazing!"

"I like when my OT goes with me on community skills because she talks with me and last time we had a good time choosing X-box games."



Remembrance Day

On Remembrance Day, our students and staff came together to learn about the significance of the day, the symbolism of the poppy, and to reflect on the courage and sacrifice of those who have served for the freedoms we enjoy today.

A member of staff who served in the armed forces shared their memories and reflections in short film clips shown in our Immersive Learning Zone helping to make these important stories accessible to everyone, giving us all a moment to pause and remember.

Supporting local wildlife

On 11 November, college students from the Employability and Vocational Pathway and Sixth Form students welcomed volunteers from Exclusive Networks and Jenny Griffiths from AVLAN (Alton and Villages Local Action For Nature) for a day dedicated to supporting local wildlife.

The day began with an inspiring presentation from Jenny, who spoke about the work of AVLAN and the importance of creating habitats for insects and pollinators. After the talk, the volunteers headed outdoors to put their new knowledge into practice, building bug hotels across the campus.









Multi-sensory journey into Caribbean culture.

As part of their 'Generations' topic, KS3 students have been exploring the important story of the Windrush Generation. Thanks to the Willis Museum and Sainsbury Gallery, who generously shared their 2023 exhibition pack Our Windrush Story, we transformed our Outdoor Learning Classroom into an interactive 'museum' experience for the whole of KS3.

Students learned about the significant contributions of the Windrush Generation to Basingstoke while taking part in a vibrant, multi-sensory journey into Caribbean culture. Students had the opportunity to explore traditional foods and spices, play steel drums, investigate themed suitcases, learn about Caribbean geography and flags, and immerse themselves in authentic music. This cross-curricular experience really brought the students' learning to life for them in an engaging and meaningful experience.



KS3 students visit a local care home

As part of their topic on 'Generations', Treloar's students visited a local care home to meet and chat with residents from an older generation. This enriching experience gave them the chance to connect across age groups, ask thoughtful, pre-prepared questions and hear fascinating stories from the past.

The visit sparked meaningful conversations, built empathy and helped students deepen their understanding of history and community. It was a wonderful way to make what they have been learning real and relevant.





When disability is no barrier to exceptional music-making

On Friday, 14 November, in the beautiful Chawton House, Treloar's former student Alessandro Vazzana performed with the Clarion Trio: Oscar Abbott on piano, Georgina Spray on French horn, and Alessandro on Clarion.

The programme featured modern works which were perfectly suited for a lunchtime audience in Jane Austen's home village. This talented trio demonstrated that disability is no barrier to exceptional music-making. Their timing, dynamic sensitivity, and focus were evident in every note, leaving the audience spellbound.

Jocelyn Watkins said: "As a music teacher of children and young people with disabilities, a trustee of Open Up Music (the creators of Clarion), and a musician myself, this felt like the beginning of a new era-where traditional and modern instruments coexist without boundaries. These musicians have faced significant prejudice along their journey, and I listened with immense pride. This was not an audience hearing 'disabled musicians'; this was an audience just listening to beautifully played music."



Future Fest

For over 25 years now the Future Fest transition event has provided a very successful and vital information service so that students can begin to investigate options available to them for when they leave Treloar's.

On 13 February 2026, we will host the event on site. Service providers are invited to Treloar's for the day to participate in an exhibition during which KS4 and Sixth Form students, their families and the staff are all able to access the people and resources the exhibition provides.

Introduction to switches

Our Assistive Technology Team has recommended websites for parents and carers who would like to practice some Switch access and have fun with their young person over Christmas break:

A switch is a device for controlling assistive technology for people who have difficulty with touch screen, mice or keyboards.

Switches can be activated with:

- head or chin,
- finger(s), arm or hand,
- knee or foot,
- voice
- eye-blink, etc.

In the context of access, a switch can be used by a person with complex disabilities to control a computer or tablet device. A switch, coupled with appropriate software and hardware, can also be used to control an individual's environment (environmental control), e.g. to close and open curtains, turn a TV on and off etc.

You can use a switch to:

- Operate a toy to help develop an understanding of 'cause and effect'
- Access a communication aid or control a computer, tablet or phone
- Control devices at home in conjunction with an environmental control system
- Drive a power wheelchair
- Play video games

3D printing to enhance educational access

Our Assistive Technologist,
Dean Hall, attended the TechAbility
Conference in Nottingham in
November where he delivered
a session on how 3D printing is
used at Treloar's to enhance
educational access of our students.

At TechAbility25, attended by practitioners in assistive technology, Dean showcased 4 case studies that demonstrate how 3D-printed solutions are helping students at Treloar School and College to:

- Improve mobility
- Access and play musical instruments
- Take active part in lessons and activities

Spotlight on the PE Option for KS4

A key feature of KS4 are the wonderful learning experiences on offer in the form of Options.

The concept of Options for KS4 is to enable students to have autonomy over their learning and develop their passions.

During Option PE so far students have been thinking about Leadership.

'Freya the Terrible Teacher' made a guest appearance highlighting how not to teach and the students were quick to tell staff what was wrong with the session, one even commenting: "I came here to do PE not wait around" before the theme of the lesson became clear and we all were able to laugh about the awful lesson presented. Soon students were animatedly discussing the strengths of a leader and things that should be done in each PE Lesson.

They have all been planning their Warm Ups for future leadership sessions and thinking how different skills can be broken up in to different stages to make them easier to grasp. We also thought about language when giving instructions and demonstrations but also how students might need to change or modify an activity to suit.

Wacky Racers

During their weekly Occupational Therapy and Speech and Language Therapy sessions, Treloar's primary students have been busy bringing their own Wacky Racers to life: from designing and measuring to decorating and building. This hands-on project has been a wonderful way to develop fine motor skills, decision-making, communication and imagination. It has also been a fantastic motivator for students learning powered mobility, giving everyone the chance to join in the race.







International Volunteer Day

Every year on 5 December Treloar's community recognises international volunteers who help us transform lives of children and young people at Treloar School and College.

Since 2014, Treloar's has been welcoming international volunteers who join our school and college across various departments. Thanks to the partnership with International Cultural Youth Exchange (ICYE), we are able to offer work experience and support volunteers from all walks of life.

Being a volunteer at Treloar's offers the opportunity for practical experience of living with, and caring for young people who, because of disability or illness, require the very special support available onsite. Moreover, all volunteers have access to professional training which helps them prepare and gain experience within their roles.

- **Inclusive**: e.g. staff who model inclusive behaviours, may actively promote an inclusive culture, or work to remove barriers for our students and others.
- Integrity and Respect: e.g. staff who listen to students' views, or support them to make age-appropriate choices; they may treat everyone with mutual respect, or support a culture of openness and honesty.
- Striving for Excellence: e.g. staff who provide students and families with outstanding care and support, who actively challenge others to ensure quality improvement, or innovate to ensure students receive the cutting-edge, excellent support they deserve.
