

## Coronavirus Vaccine






There is now a vaccine for Coronavirus.




Vaccines protect you and other people from catching viruses and diseases.

Things like flu.




Doctors and scientists think that if people have the vaccine, less people will get ill from Coronavirus.





You have been offered this vaccine because you could be at risk of being ill from Coronavirus.




You can choose whether you have the vaccine.



If you are not sure about having the vaccine, people can support you to get more information.




This could be people you trust, family, friends or staff that support you.

You can say no if you do not want the vaccine.




Having a vaccine is your choice.



If you have the vaccine a doctor or nurse will give you the injection in your arm.


This will be your first injection.

Some people might have sore muscles or a temperature after the injection. This is because the vaccine is new to your body.




If you are worried you can talk to a nurse or doctor.
