Academic Appeals procedure




When you do exams or coursework at Treloar's your teachers will give you a grade based on your work.



The teacher who marks your work will have been trained to do this. They will do their best to mark your work in a way that is fair. Teachers use the results from tests that you do and examples of your work to decide your grade. They also have to show their grades to other teachers. This is called moderation. The Head of School or Head of College must check that all grades have been decided correctly and that none were decided by just one teacher.



If you are worried that your mark is wrong you can ask Treloar's to **review** your grade. This means to think about or talk about your grade again and to make changes to it **or** make a decision to keep it the same.



After Treloar's have reviewed your grade if you still think your grade is wrong you can ask Treloar's to make a formal **Appeal** for you to the Principal or Head of School or Head of College. **Appeal** means to ask for your grade to be checked again.

You can appeal if:



 The assessment or exam didn't follow the rules or guidelines (information to advise people on how something should be done)



 Your performance (how well you did) was affected by something that school or college staff didn't know about at the time, for example, you weren't provided with the correct equipment for your access arrangements.




• The teachers who marked your exam did so unfairly or incorrectly.



If you decide to make an Appeal you need to write to the Principal to say why you think your grade was wrong and why you think it should be changed. Your Form Tutor or Deputy Head of School or College can help you do this.

If you make an appeal your grade could go up or down.



The people who make this decision are called 'The Appeal Panel'. They will look at the reasons you think the grade is wrong. If they decide that your grade is wrong, or they find there was a mistake which affected the grade they may change the grade. Your new grade could be higher or lower than the result you were given on results day.
