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Updates from Sally Nissen, Head of Nursing and Healthcare

Infectious diseases

Thank you for your support in managing infectious illnesses. Covid remains an issue for us and the wider community. We have access to LFD tests and will offer these when we suspect Covid. Where we suspect an outbreak, we bring in face masks for staff in those areas and have seen this to be very



effective. Please continue to follow NHS guidance, and keep students at home when they are unwell. We recommend you take advantage of Covid and flu vaccinations where possible, to reduce the risk of serious illness.

Dental Services

The visiting dental service have ceased onsite dental clinics. You will have been contacted individually if this affects you. Arranging dental appointment is the responsibility of the student or family and we are unable to escort students to off site dental appointments, unless it is an emergency — please bear this in mind when making decisions about registering with a dental practice.

Newly prescribed medicines and medicine changes

Reminder: For all new medicines or prescription changes, we need written confirmation from the prescriber before we can make any changes ourselves to the medicines administration record (eMAR). Written confirmation can include: the right hand side of the repeat prescription, a clinic letter, or a recent GP medical printout. Send to: medicalsecretary@treloar.org.uk before the start of term. Where possible, please send medicine in unopened packaging, with a legible prescription label, within date and with a note to show when it was opened (if liquid or cream).

Day students and those not registered with the contracted (onsite) GP

Reminder: Please ask your GP for sufficient medicine stock to be kept at School, as well as at home, so you do not need to send it every day. This will save you efforts and help reduce the hours each week our nurses spend checking in daily medicines. If you need a letter supporting this request please let us know. Once again, please email: medicalsecretary@treloar.org.uk

Student absence for planned surgery, hospital admission or sickness (over seven days)

Reminder: Please contact your students' Progress and Transition Co-ordinator (PTC) to arrange a reassessment following illness or hospital admission. It is helpful to have as much notice and detail, so we can plan and arrange this as soon as possible. Depending on the circumstances, this may be an onsite reassessment involving members of the multidisciplinary team (parents/carers are asked to remain onsite) or it may be a phone call.

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Updates from Ben Baxter, Head Safeguarding

At Treloar's we are all committed to safeguarding. In partnership with the Hampshire Safeguarding Children Partnership (HSCP) board, we've been working to ensure that the voice of students and independent education settings is considered within the work that the partnership does to keep children safe across Hampshire (and beyond).

A brief guide to exploitation (criminal, sexual, radicalisation) for parents and carers What is Exploitation?

Child Exploitation - Hampshire SCP

Exploitation and extra-familial harms are risks to children or young people that happen within the community or peer group (both in person, or online), including sexual and criminal exploitation.

A key element of extra-familial harm is that in general, harm does not arise from the home environment - parents or carers may not be aware that this is happening, or may struggle to protect their child or young person from this.

Extra-familial harm can take the form of:

- <u>Sexual exploitation.</u>
- <u>Criminal exploitation</u> including drug dealing both locally and through county lines.
- Modern slavery and trafficking.
- Gang activity and youth violence.
- Radicalisation.

Exploitation is based on a power imbalance in the relationship between the child and their exploiter from which the exploiter is able to control the movement and behaviour of the child and enable them to be used for the exploiters personal or financial gain.

Exploiters may "groom" victims first in order to gain influence over them and thus enable their exploitation. This can happen in person, or online. Once they have the child's trust the method of control moves to manipulation, duress, force or fear, making exit from the exploitation very difficult.

If you do one thing...

Remember that exploitation can affect any child or young person, and that it affects those with disabilities too – know the warning signs.


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Celebrating student achievements

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Chris's Kilimanjaro Trek raises £4000 for Treloar's

In recent years, Chris has conquered some of the UK's tallest peaks, but then decided to do a trek in aid of Treloar's. The Kilimanjaro Trek was his first overseas trek.

"As a father to Alex, an amazing, jolly, but profoundly physically disabled nine-year-old, I am acutely aware of how much support disabled children need: physically, emotionally and through all kinds of specialist input.

Alex, along with all his schoolmates, receives all of this

and more at Treloar School, and in the current difficult economic environment, I want to do a little bit extra to help the school continue to provide all the brilliant activities they possibly can, helping all the children to live full, interesting and exciting lives."

How to prepare for a trek?

Chris said: "You have to be overprepared both physically and mentally. I started training in January as I knew that we would have Alex to care for over the summer holidays, so I would not be able to spend all summer preparing. So up until June, I'd been focused on an intensive training regime. Year to date, I've travelled 777km as the crow flies and climbed 21,000m, over 3x the height of Kili. Before the end of July, I did over a thousand kilometres; I spent August going through the kit, sorting out the equipment for the trek."

Chris's took his preparation for the trek seriously: he spoke to people who had done similar treks and did altitude training. He knew what to expect. He did his research. With no contact with his family for two weeks and no access to the Internet, Chris knew that it was absolutely crucial to prepare well for the trek. The gear had to be right and the mindset - being positive was the key. Drinking five litres of water per day to keep his blood thin to avoid altitude sickness, Chris took every day as it came and stayed positive right until the end. To the question about the most difficult part of the trek, Chris responded:

"Being away for two weeks was the most difficult part. Susie at home with Alex was the trickiest part to reconcile. But being a parent to Alex provides you with a lot of strength."

"Seven days trekking across the beautiful, remote Northern slopes of the mountain, through rainforest, alpine grasslands and stunning vistas of volcanic rock, followed by a summit push up the last 1000m of steep shale that began at 10pm and ended at 7am as the sun rose. All the altitude training came to bear on that final climb to the top, but standing on the summit of Africa made the whole year's preparation worth it! Massive thanks to everyone who donated, and the wonderful group of people who helped me to get there!"

Twinvincibles: anything is possible

I am James, younger cousin to Tommy and Alice who attend Treloar College. My cousins are incredible, we call them the Twinvincibles



because no matter what, they defeat any obstacle put in their way. The twins were born prematurely at just 24 weeks, and they had a rocky start to life, spending their first nine months in hospital. Unfortunately, that resulted in severe and complex disabilities — their diagnosis is quadriplegic, athetoid cerebral palsy with dystonia. This means that they are in wheelchairs, nonverbal, tube fed and are reliant on adult support for every aspect of daily life. For all that, they love life and are full of smiles and fun — with our family's adventurous





I have participated in many adventurous activities with the twins that most people would not think possible like surfing, canoeing, cycling and more. I am writing this blog to show you that even though my cousins have disabilities, it does not prevent them from participating in activities that most people immediately regard as not possible for them.

One of my favourite activities with the twins was surfing at Caswell Bay in Wales. The company was called <u>Surfability</u> and they had amazing custom surfboards which allowed someone to accompany the twins on board. This made the whole family and me very happy because we got to see Tommy and Alice doing activities we never would have guessed possible and

enjoying it so much. It was amazing being together, making these wonderful memories.

Another one of the adventurous activities we have done is <u>canoeing</u>. The company we did this with customised their canoes allowing us to put the wheelchairs in them so the twins could join us while we paddled down the river. We had quite a comedic time getting the chairs down the slippery muddy riverbank!

Hopefully, this blog inspires you try some of these great activities. The next adventure we plan on doing with the twins is <u>paragliding</u>, I can't wait!

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
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Silver and Bronze awards for DofE students

This year we're celebrating having the largest group of students to date, enrolled for the Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme, a significant achievement for all the students involved and the staff who've supported them and enabled them to take part.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme helps students to challenge themselves and get



involved in different activities, such as expeditions which involve using problem solving skills and motivate them to spend time outdoors. It also encourages them to have commitment in following something through which is required particularly in the skills, physical and volunteering sections, one of which has to be done regularly for a period of six months.

A total of 35 students were enrolled for their DofE award last year, 30 Bronze and 5 Silver.

Students completed their various sections by participating in after school clubs such as Art and Dungeons & Dragons clubs. Some students chose activities from the School curriculum such as cooking, swimming and physiotherapy.

The volunteering activities included one class writing a book of poems which was published and sold for their chosen charity. One class grew plants and had a plant sale to raise money for their chosen charity. A popular choice for the volunteering option was to help out in after school clubs. Students chose: Nail bar club, Uno club and Twilight club.

Achievements

The students all had to engage in a certain amount of map reading, according to their abilities on the expedition. The silver group had an external assessor to assess their skills and had to stay overnight at Woodlarks Campsite in Farnham, where they had to plan, prepare and clear up after themselves for their day's activity. They had to manage their time and attend their various activities regularly and in some cases learn a new skill.

Impact and Benefits

Completing the DofE award has given the students a sense of pride and self-confidence and the feeling that they can achieve what peers from other schools can achieve. Teamwork was encouraged on the expedition, with each student taking turns to lead their group and do the map reading, asking the others for help when needed. Overall, the students had a positive experience of the DofE. At the silver presentation to external visitors and their peers, all said, without exception, that they would definitely recommend the experience.

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Boccia day at Treloar School

On Thursday 21st September, our lovely friends from Angmering School from West Sussex came to Treloar School for a day of Boccia fun. The last time they visited us was before the Covid pandemic!



Our brand new Boccia Squad took on the students from Angmering and together played some excellent Boccia. Whilst the day was very busy with seven matches played, the students from both schools were able to socialise with each other as well as play competitive Boccia.

Fun was had by all and they promised to visit us again in the new year!

Recent Boccia successes for Treloar School alumni

Treloar's patron and former student, David Smith OBE won gold in Povoa de Varzim 2023 World Boccia Cup after beating Muhamad Syafa (IND) 3-1 at the beginning of October. David Smith OBE is Britain's best ever Boccia player. He described winning Team Gold as a career highlight.

Last week, Treloar College student Sophie won gold during the Scottish Boccia Open. Sophie was named as one of Boccia UK's new Talent Transition Squad in June this year, alongside her classmate Harrison. Both students have enjoyed more opportunities to compete internationally, as well as taking part in training camps with world class players.

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Medals for Treloar's Swim Squad at Gala event



Treloar School was shortlisted for two awards:



- Breaking Barriers: for its work with Clarion
- Impact: for its development of School Literacy Curriculum

Lisa Bond, Head of Treloar School, said:

Treloar School does not accept commonly recognised limitations. We break down barriers through our exemplary multi-disciplinary holistic approach to education and develop personalised and bespoke curriculums which enable students to achieve their best and meet their full capabilities. From when a student arrives at Treloar's, specialist staff harness their expertise to break down barriers and nurture students from their individual starting points, learning of their interests and ambitions for the future.

Treloar's Music Department is a great example of this. The team has taken this further by building a relationship with Open up Music and their creation 'Clarion'. Clarion is an innovative accessible instrument that can be played expressively with any part of the body, including eye movement using iPads and PCs. Clarion technology works with the movement of the musician rather than the musician having to adapt to an instrument.

The Music Department has more than developed the use of Clarion at Treloar School. They look beyond seeing it as a stand-alone instrument for students by increasing opportunities for access and enabling creativity and expression. Treloar's staff have seen first-hand the benefits of this collaboration which has enabled students to increase their access to music but more importantly offering them the chance to develop musical skills, progressing from playing single notes to performing both internally and externally as part of an orchestra. Treloar's invests in the future and sustainability of the use of Clarion by employing a peripatetic music teacher to lead both individual and group Clarion music sessions.

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Skills Builder Gold Award for Treloar College

Last year, Treloar College started a partnership with Skills Builder, a global movement of employers, educators, and impact organisations working together to support individuals in building their essential skills.

We are excited to share with everyone that Treloar College has been awarded a Skills Builder Gold Award!

This puts us in a select group of schools and colleges that have demonstrated a commitment to building students' essential skills.

Skills builder has integrated well and added structure to the development of students independence and life skills that we already embed into College curriculum. Skills Builder platform is accessible, simple and clear to use and always 'on hand' when needed for a visual interactive lesson, a self-assessment for students or just as a visual prompt to recognise when good use of skills has occurred. Bringing Skills Builder into College has added so many positives, bringing social opportunities, assemblies and a healthy amount of competition to the groups. Skills Builder sits perfectly alongside College Employability programme, allowing learners access to a detailed platform of information enhancing their understanding of the essential skills. Students have benefited from the identification and recognition of their essential skill use. They have enjoyed celebrating awards/certificates they or their peers received in the weekly celebration assembly. College weekly celebration assembly is a special moment for students and staff to recognise achievements. Skills Builder has given teachers focus and motivation and allowed them to assess their learners thoroughly in the skills that will really make a difference to their futures. Students are more aware of their achievements and strengths and becoming more confident members of the community.

Students at Treloar's are able to practise and use their essential skills in wider life on a daily basis. College community skills and residential programmes encourage and challenge students to continually develop their essential skills. Treloar's extensive internal, external and virtual work experience programme also compliments this. Regular opportunities to meet and speak with employers is facilitated through Treloar's transition programme. College weekly Skills Builder assembly celebrates the examples of students demonstrating the essential skills in their everyday college life.

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Happy 20th anniversary to Campbell Court

On Friday, 20th October 2023, we celebrate 20 years since Campbell Court was opened. Campbell Court is a community of seven self-contained ground floor flats offering an independent living skills service for young disabled adults, aged 18 – 35, who have the potential to benefit from receiving a longer term independence skills learning and development package in a safe and supportive environment.



Often described as 'Treloar's best kept secret', we spoke to residents who told us about what it's like to live at Campbell Court.

Zoe, resident at Campbell Court

"Living at Campbell Court has helped me build my skills up. I was worried at first, and now I love it — I chose what I do and what times; I have made friends here. The independence I have gained while living at Campbell Court is my proudest achievement, together with winning third place in a Boccia competition. There are only seven tenants here, but the small scale helps it feel like a family."

Matthew, resident at Campbell Court

"Having a keyworker has really helped me gain more confidence talking to people in the community. I have done a lot of volunteering around here and in Holybourne and at the Theatre. I am front of house, I give out programmes. I've worked at the Hub Shop at Treloar's, stocktaking, doing the till with guidance, staff helped him to understand money. I also do my own shopping every Thursday, I go out, I have my own vehicle here (for the staff to drive). They have a really good team here at Campbell Court. They will try and push you, advise you to go out and try new things you haven't tried before. You could be really safe in their hands and we're a good team here. Come down here and try it yourself. I love it here."

Eoin, resident at Campbell Court

"There's nowhere else like Campbell Court. It allows me to book the support when I need it and how I need it. It allows me to look for jobs around Alton. It helps me — they supported me when I found a job, at first they used to drive me there, but I've been going on the bus. I book a driver or I can go on the bus. I work in the Job Centre as an admin officer in Basingstoke. I really like it, it's never the same, always something different to do. Finding a job was my proudest moment here. I would say 'Go for it' to anyone who is thinking of applying for a place at Campbell Court. All the staff are very nice, they will build on your independence skills so when you move on, you can be more independent."

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Can you help with our transport problem?

We're very lucky to have a fleet of 10 vehicles to help transport our students to and from Treloar's; home drop-offs; various appointments; journeys for work experience; community skill outings; School and College trips as well as taking students to and from HSDC Alton College.

You may be surprised to hear that each year the fleet undertakes around 3,500 journeys.

With this in mind, we're also trying to balance our environmental impact with various initiatives being introduced across School and College. We're extremely grateful to an individual donor who fully funded our first electric mini-bus last year. This bus can transport up to two students in their electric wheelchairs plus their carers. This has been a fantastic addition to our fleet as well as a great step towards becoming more sustainable, reducing our use of non-renewable energy.

However, we're still not able to fulfil all our transport requirements and can often face the choice of declining trips or hiring in additional transport. We would like to purchase a second, larger electric bus to help with our transport requirements.

Can you help us fundraise for a larger electric bus? This second electric bus will be able to transport up to seven students in their electric wheelchairs and nine other passengers for teachers and support staff. It has up to a 300-mile range, zero emissions and would be kitted out to a high specification with the necessary requirements to meet the needs of our students. It is 9.3m long with a tail-lift and tracking lines embedded into the floor to secure wheelchairs and will also have a Hearing Aid Loop.

The cost of this vehicle is £288.890 and with thanks to the fantastic support of some of our donors, including <u>East Hampshire District Council</u>, we've already received over £113,000. However, we still need to raise **£175,890**.
