

Infectious diseases

We are aware that measles, chickenpox and flu are circulating in the local communities. Please continue to keep students at home if they are unwell. Contact your GP if you have questions about immunisations. Please alert us of any changes to your young person's immunisations status on Medicalsecretary@treloar.org.uk

Students arriving without medicines

Students must have access to their medicines when they need them. Recently we have seen



Where medicines are supplied by a different GP surgery or come from home, students will occasionally arrive without them, or without the correct information which means we are unable to administer the correct dose. These issues can put students at risk of either missing doses, or receiving the incorrect dosage of medicines. This can present risk of harm.

We will always seek to put student welfare first and try to resolve problems through communication and cooperation. However, where medicines, or information relating to medicines is not present, this can present risk to students, as well as significant work for nurses reducing the time they have to directly support students with health needs.

Where we have concerns that we do not have sufficient medicine or information to keep a student safe we may require the student to be collected. In such instances we would also likely need to raise this as a safeguarding concern.

We therefore ask you ensure the student has their medicines, or provide information in a timely manner when asked. Please call the Health Centre if you have questions about this, or if you are facing difficulties or barriers in obtaining medicines or information.

Blood results and medical records

You may already be aware that there are options for accessing medical records, ordering medicines, and checking test results. A number of mobile apps enable this, including the NHS account. We encourage students or parents to arrange access.

Some GP practices allow people aged 13, 14 or 15 to use the NHS account. It is also possible to access the app on behalf of another.

You can ask the student's GP surgery to register



you for proxy access. They will guide you through registration. You'll need to provide identification to the GP surgery so they can confirm who you are and check you are the correct person to act on their patient's behalf. When the surgery has checked your identity and registered you for proxy access, you'll be able to use an option in the NHS App and NHS Website to manage services for another person. You can go to the homepage and select 'switch profiles'.

Promoting the vote

At Treloar's, our value that "we are inclusive" means that we are committed to supporting students to be included as a part of society, not just as a student at Treloar's.

We believe that it is vital that people with disabilities are fully represented and able to have their voice heard as individuals.

A UK General Election to elect the next UK Government at Westminster is expected to take place sometime in 2024.



The right to vote is not just a privilege but a fundamental aspect of citizenship, allowing individuals to actively participate in decisions that impact their lives and communities. Yet, sadly, many young people with disabilities feel disenfranchised or disengaged from the political process. Whether due to physical barriers at polling stations or a lack of accessible information, people with disabilities often face additional hurdles when it comes to exercising their democratic rights.

The right to vote in the UK is open to all adults aged 18 or over, irrespective of disability. Importantly "mental capacity" is no longer considered a legal requirement for voting or voter registration, provided that they are making the decision themselves, and not those who care for or who otherwise make decisions for them.

Registering to vote: Students are able to register to vote from age 16, in advance of being able to vote if they are 18 at the time of an election.

Voter ID is also required now and in the absence of any other valid photo ID can be accessed using the following links:

Ways to support students to exercise their right to vote:

Voting in person: A person with a disability who wishes to vote in person should be provided with reasonable adjustments to support them, where possible, to vote independently and in secret.

This should include (among other measures) having large print versions of the ballot paper at the polling station, but also considering braille, audible and pictorial versions; polling booths at wheelchair accessible heights and pencil grips to support voters with reduced dexterity – contact your local electoral office if you need any specific adaptations or information.

Where a voter is not able to independently vote they are permitted a "companion" who can support them to vote – provided that the



decision at voting is the person's, not the decision of the companion. In this case provide the presiding officer with:

- A written or verbal declaration from the voter that they can't vote without assistance
- A written declaration from the companion that they are aged 18+ and have not previously assisted more than one voter with a disability to vote at this election.

If there are any problems or issues you should ask to speak to the "Returning Officer" – the polling station will have their contact details.

Voting by post: A person can apply to vote by post – either for a single election, or for a period of up to 3 years. If you applied to vote by post at the last general election you would need to reapply again.

This can be done at: https://www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote

If you have applied to vote by post, but forget to post it, you are able to take the form to your local polling station on election day.

Voting by proxy: A person can apply for someone to vote for them. An <u>"easy read" guide to this is available here</u>.

The application form requests a handwritten signature, however if you are unable to provide a signature (or one that is consistently the same) there is a section to note a waiver so this isn't needed – contact your local electoral office.

Pedal Power Training

On-site therapists and medical staff are one of the many things that make Treloar's so special. It means that therapy can be integrated into our students' education and care programmes, as part of the working day curriculum.

Thanks to the collaboration between Treloar's PE Team and the Physiotherapy Department, we welcomed Julie and Nikki from Pedal Power Training who delivered a Bikeability Level 1 course to our school students.

The students learned how to control their trikes, including setting off, slowing down, braking and stopping. 25 students earned their Level 1 certificate and had lots of fun along the way. Rachael Hall, Highly Specialist Physiotherapist at Treloar's, said:



"Cycling is a great activity for our students; it gives them a chance to exercise out of their wheelchairs. Cycling is a form of low impact cardiovascular exercise and using adapted trikes allows our students to participate as fully as possible with the activity. For our students the benefits are not just fitness and general health but, more holistically, triking allows more independent movement, social opportunities and a great sense of personal challenge and achievement. The skills learnt during the sessions with Pedal **Power Training increase the road** safety and hazard awareness of our students and will help to keep them safer if they are triking both on site and if out in the community with their families."

World Book Day

Here at Treloar's, World Book Day is the highlight of the term when both staff and students dress up as their favourite book characters and participate in numerous activities across the campus.

The PE and Swim Team all dressed as characters from Peter Pan. The students were all invited to Neverland located in Pike Hall where they took part in Peter Pan-themed PE activities.

For the primary classes, all lessons were linked to World Book Day; students practiced their numeracy and literacy skills role playing a book shop.

Besides the bookshop role play, where the students worked around



their targets either comparing amounts of books, or counting them, or adding them; in the afternoon, all Primary classes went for a fairy tale themed scavenger hunt, enjoyed famous story sacks like 'The Tiger who came to Tea' and then joined the PE and Swim Team for their Peter Pan activities.

The Technology Team also dressed up as book characters and set up a reading hub for students in the reception area. Everyone was welcome to come and listen to the stories read by Helen Cronshaw, Head of Learning Technology.

STEM Fair

We kicked off Science Week with a STEM Fair on Monday morning. A range of visitors came to talk about their jobs in STEM: 2Excel Engineering talked about aircraft maintenance; healthcare specialists shared their expertise on subjects like podiatry, food science and general health. There were also Science lectures from HSDC Alton carrying out various experiments and talking to students about their specialisms and an archaeology display and a talk from archaeologist James.



Science Week

Monday 11 March, was the start of Science Week for Treloar School and College students. For the whole week, everyone could enjoy Science-related activities: there was a science show delivered by Damon from Sublime Science who carried out various experiments and Mill Cottage Farm visited us with their farm animals. On Thursday, we saw First Class Falconry with his birds of prey, while on Friday we welcomed Alton College's Space Satellite Programme team.

The rest of the week was also full of exciting activities: the Sublime Science show took place on Tuesday and was filled with experiments that were thoroughly enjoyed by both staff and students. On Wednesday and Thursday students had an opportunity to spend time, learn about and even interact with farm animals and birds of prey. On Friday we welcomed guest lecturer, Fiona Pope, from HSDC Alton College. We closed Science Week with a whole school assembly about women scientists and shared highlights from the week.

Student Voice

Taking place every term, the theme for March Student Voice was 'The new library'. Primary students were given time and tools to present their ideas for what they would like the new library to look like.

Dressed up as story characters in the first session, students designed a logo for the library and watched some puppet show and switch Then, in their second session, the students had access to bean bags with audio books and a sensory story.

The groups spent 30 minutes in each session and the last half hour was devoted to a discussion and further suggestions for the new library.



Periklis Karachalias, Treloar's SEN Teacher, said: "Student voice takes place once a term, preparing our students for the school students' council meetings with more students and longer conversations. We prepare the students by giving them different activities to experience in different contexts. For example, our last Students' voice meeting was about the new library. After a range of activities, the students have had a conversation with me and Louise Harding (Treloar's LRC Manager), seeing the plans for the new library, choosing the colours they like for the walls and

flooring, expressing their opinions and views about activities and resources they are expecting to have. Most students suggested the following colours for the new library: yellow, blue, purple."

It was created for a young student who has a disability and wanted to learn how to play the guitar. It has many features which meant that all students could access it. The students all thought it was excellent and great fun to play!

In preparation for the competition students collaborated with choreographers, Jinny and Amanda and music and visual artist Ricky to develop their ideas into a performance.

The students dance retold the true story of George Swindlehurst, a war veteran who at the end of WWII was shot in the back by a sniper and paralysed. During his rehabilitation he met Winnie the nurse who he fell in love with and later married. George demonstrated resilience and a never give up attitude gaining knowledge and skills in Paralympic table tennis and basketball. He went on to represent Great Britain in the Paralympic's winning medals in both sports.



The students represented the key moments in George's life through a sequence of dance scenes supported by costumes, props and a video and soundtrack.

Student feedback is that they not only loved the opportunity to perform but also the rehearsals of the other schools and the opportunity to get know other students during the afternoon disco.
